• We are sinners who fall short of our purpose to glorify God

Whether, then, you eat or drink or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God. (1 Corinthians 10:31)



• We are sinners who fall short of our purpose to glorify God

• We deserve God's wrath

For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men who suppress the truth in unrighteousness. (Romans 1:18)

There will be tribulation and distress for every soul of man who does evil, of the Jew first and also of the Greek, but glory and honor and peace to everyone who does good, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For there is no partiality with God. (Romans 2:9-11)

God Justifies the Guilty Romans 3:24

• We are pronounced innocent, acquitted of our crimes

But wishing to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29)





God Justifies the Guilty Romans 3:24

• We are pronounced innocent, acquitted of our crimes

• God justifies impartially (Romans 3:22)

• God justifies by grace (Romans 3:24)

How can God pronounce the guilty innocent and still be a righteous judge?



How God Justifies Romans 3:24-25

• Redemption – the cost of releasing a prisoner or slave

...knowing that you were not redeemed with perishable things like silver and gold from your futile way of life inherited from your forefathers, but with precious blood, as of a lamb unblemished and spotless, the blood of Christ. (1 Peter 1:18-19)



How God Justifies Romans 3:24-25

• Redemption – the cost of releasing a prisoner or slave

In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace which He lavished on us.

(Ephesians 1:7-8)



How God Justifies Romans 3:24-25

• Redemption – the cost of releasing a prisoner or slave

- Propitiation the cost of repairing a damaged relationship
 - Blood required (Leviticus 16-17)

...whom God displayed publicly as a propitiation in His blood through faith. (Romans 3:25)



Why God Justifies Romans 3:25-26

• God's righteousness (v. 21, 22, 25, 26, 1:17)

• He is JUST because He condemned sin

For what the Law could not do, weak as it was through the flesh, God did: sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and as an offering for sin, He condemned sin in the flesh... (Romans 8:3)



Why God Justifies Romans 3:25-26

• God's righteousness (v. 21, 22, 25, 26, 1:17)

• He is JUST because He condemned sin

• He is the JUSIFIER because He saved sinners

But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8)



But He was pierced through for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities;

The chastening for our well-being fell upon Him,

And by His scourging we are healed.

All of us like sheep have gone astray,

Each of us has turned to his own way;

But the LORD has caused the iniquity of us all

To fall on Him.



And He died for all, so that they who live might no longer live for themselves, but for Him who died and rose again on their behalf.

He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.

2 Corinthians 5:15, 21



And He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you were healed.
